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

MAIL STATIONS

There has been a little confusion related to the ownership of the mailbox/mail stations. The board has had conversations the to Spring Hill Post Master and was informed that the post office has no responsibility in changing locks. As of 2/12/24, if a homeowner loses a mailbox key and would like a new lock installed, you must contact the office and pre pay the \$20.00 fee. A member of the board will schedule a time to change the lock for you. The same rule applies to a new home owner moving into the community and not being left a mailbox key, they too can contact the office for assistance. You still have the option of hiring an outside locksmith to replace lock if you so choose. If you see someone changing a lock on a mailbox and you have questions, ASK, the owner of the mailbox and a board member/locksmith will be doing the work.

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The Easter Bunny's Connection to Christianity

The origin of the Easter Bunny dates back to the 13th century in Germany. The Germanic folk, known as the Teutons, worshiped pagan gods and goddesses. One such goddess was Eostra (otherwise known as Ostara or ?ostre). She was revered as the goddess of fertility and spring. The word "Easter" finds its etymology from the goddess's name.

Due to its prolific breeding tendencies, the rabbit became a symbol for Eostra. In AD 595, Pope Gregory sent Roman monks to convert the Anglo-Saxons. The Anglo-Saxons, like German forefathers, celebrated Eostra. When converted, they accepted the celebration of Jesus Christ's resurrection at Easter while still continuing the celebration of spring renewal and the rabbit's symbolism.

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


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
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April 8, 2024 — (Total Solar Eclipse) Great North American Eclipse

The narrow path of totality—where the Moon covers the Sun completely, causing a total eclipse—runs through Mexico (from Sinaloa to Coahuila), the USA (from Texas to Maine), and Canada (from Ontario to Newfoundland). A partial eclipse will be visible across nearly all of North America, and a sliver of western Europe.



Total solar eclipses happen when the Moon passes between the Sun and the Earth, casting its umbra, the dark central portion of its shadow, on Earth. In areas around the umbra, within the penumbra, the Sun appears only partially eclipsed.

to the Sun's disk.






Third Contact The edge of the Sun's disk

Did you know?

375 Years

On average, it takes about 375 years from one total solar eclipse to the next, at a specific location.

Longest Totality

The total phase of a solar eclipse can last up to 7 minutes and 30 seconds.

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A solar eclipse always happens 2 weeks before or after a lunar eclipse.


Here are some things you can do to make our planet a better place to live.

Here are some things you can do to help plants and wildlife.

Do not disturb the natural habitats of plants and animals. Do not pick wildflowers or gather critters for pets.



Talk to people at home or to your teacher about planting a garden to attract butterflies and birds. These gardens provide habitats to replace those taken away by buildings, streets, and parking lots.







Reduce Reuse Recycle

- Fix something that's broken instead of throwing à away.
- When you buy something, carry it home without a bag or take your own bag to the store. Avoid using throw-
- away forks and cups. Refill empty bottles of water instead of buying new ones.
- Use both sides of every sheet of paper. Save scrap paper for recycling. Buy and use things that are made to last.
- Buy goods that require less wrapping and packaging.
- Reuse empty jars as holders for things like pencils and pens.
- Instead of throwing out food waste and grass clippings, use them to make compost, which turns into
- Separate trash so you can recycle paper, glass, aluminum cans, and plastic.
- Take old cell phones and other electronic equipment to a recycling center.

Your Part

There are many ways to reduce your carbon footprint. One way is to use less energy. Another is to consume food items that require less energy during the production process.

- Compact Fluorescent Lights, or CFLs, use 75 percent less energy than standard bulbs. Plus, they last longer. Talk with adults in your home about choosing CFLs instead of standard bulbs.
- Help move furniture away from radiators, so heat goes into a room and is not absorbed by the furniture.



Homes should not be kept freezing in summer and boiling in winter. Ask adults to keep

the indoor temperature at 75°F in summer and 68°F in winter.

- To cut down on pollution linked to shipping and packaging food, plant a vegetable garden. Talk with adults who buy your food about choosing food that is grown locally (within 100 miles of home).
- Processed foods, which are frozen, canned, or packaged, carry a big carbon footprint. Eating fresh food reduces your carbon footprint. Whenever possible, choose baked potatoes instead of potato chips. Eat an apple instead of applesauce.

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Tasty Temptations Classic Italian Meatballs Prep Time: 15 minutes Cook Time: 15 minutes Total: 30 minutes Calories: 184

- 1/2 cup (54 g) fresh breadcrumbs from 1-2 slices white bread (crust removed)
- 1/4 cup (60 ml) milk
- 2 egg yolks
- 1/2 cup (50 g) grated pecorino Romano cheese
- 2 garlic cloves finely chopped or grated
- 1 tablespoon (15 g) Diamond kosher salt OR 2 teaspoons Morton's kosher salt, OR 1 1/2 teaspoons table salt
- 1 teaspoon ground black pepper
- 1 pound (450 g) ground beef chuck
- 1 pound (450 g) ground pork or veal
- 1/4 cup grated onion optional
- 1/3 cup (30 g) chopped parsley or basil
- Olive oil

DIRECTIONS

- Put the breadcrumbs in a small bowl and pour the milk over. Let them soak for 5 minutes. Add the egg yolks, cheese, garlic, salt, and pepper to the bowl and mash together to form a coarse paste.
- Put the beef, pork and onion (if using) in a large bowl and mix with a fork to blend. Add the bread mixture and parsley. Blend everything together well, using your hands, large wooden spoon or large fork. You can also mix in a standing mixer on low speed, just until blended. The meatball mixture can be mixed and refrigerated 2 days ahead of shaping and cooking.
- Form the meatballs: Use a 1/4-cup measuring cup or cookie scoop to portion the mixture and roll lightly into balls. They don't have to be perfect craggy meatballs have character and hold the sauce better!

To cook on the stovetop:

- Pour enough oil into a large skillet to coat the bottom and place over medium-high heat. When the pan is hot, add as many meatballs as will fit in the pan without crowding. Note: They should sizzle as soon as they hit they pan or the pan isn't hot enough.
- Brown the meatballs on all sides. Cover the pan, lower the heat and continue cooking and until the meatballs are firm and cooked through (165 degrees on a instant thermometer), which should take about 15 minutes total. Repeat the frying with remaining meatballs, pouring out the oil and adding a fresh layer.



To finish cooking in tomato sauce:

• After browning the meatballs, transfer them from the skillet to a simmering pot of marinara sauce. Cook 10-12 minutes.

To bake the meatballs:

- Preheat the oven to 425 degrees.
- Arrange the meatballs on an olive-oiled coated rimmed baking sheet. Bake 10 minutes, then turn the meatballs over with a spatula or pair of tongs. Continue baking until nicely browned and cooked through, another 10-12 minutes.
- Serve the warm meatballs with marinara sauce or your favorite prepared tomato sauce.

NOTES

- To make **fresh breadcrumbs**, trim off the crust from one or two slices of hearty white bread. Tear or slice the bread into small pieces or pulse in a food processor to make coarse pea-size crumbs.
- To use **dried breadcrumbs**: Adjust the amount to 1/3 cup instead of the 1/2 cup of fresh crumbs. I recommend unseasoned dried breadcrumbs. If yours are seasoned, reduce the amount of salt in the recipe by 1/2 teaspoon.
- **Panko**: Use the full amount (1/2 cup), adding more by the tablespoon if the mixture doesn't hold together
- Gluten-free breadcrumbs: Fresh or dried will work fine, following the tips above.
- Meatballs **can be made ahead** and frozen up to 2 months.
- An electric standing mixer is handy to blend the meat and seasonings if you'd rather not do it by hand.
- If you like, finish cooking the meatballs in your favorite simmering sauce in step 5.






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
